Doctors Elizabeth Gwyther (South Africa); Ednin Hamzah (Malaysia), Margaret O'Connor (Australia) and Mohammad Al-Shahri (Saudi Arabia) finished their terms as directors ending 2008. We are very grateful for their participation during their tenure as directors of the board.

We have limited representation from countries in Eastern Europe and Asia and no representative from the Middle East. We hope that individuals from countries in these regions are nominated in our next round of elections.

STRATEGIC PLAN

During 2008 and after our new Chair was elected (Roberto Wenk), we asked all the members of the Board of Directors of IAHPC and external palliative care leaders to work in a new strategic plan. They worked in different forums to evaluate and make recommendations on how we could improve our programs, products, services and structure, to meet the needs of our stakeholders and the global palliative care community.

The following summarizes the results of several of the working groups:

New mission and vision statements: The group agreed that it was time to revise and modify our mission and vision statements. The board unanimously approved the versions proposed by the corresponding group. The new mission and vision statements adopted by the IAHP are:

Mission

Our Mission is to collaborate and work to improve the quality of life of patients with advanced life-threatening conditions and their families, by advancing hospice and palliative care programs, education, research, and favorable policies around the world.

Vision

Our vision is to help to increase and optimize the availability of and access to hospice and palliative care for patients and their families throughout the world.

We achieve this by:

- facilitating and providing palliative care education and training opportunities for care providers
- acting as an information resource for professionals, health care providers and policy makers
- developing collaborative strategies for hospice and palliative care providers, organizations, institutions and individuals

Some of the additional recommendations done by the working groups in the other areas include the following:

Sustainability

- To hire or seek the help of a fundraiser.
- Develop relationships with universities and colleges for students to be able to do internships in IAHP, helping develop fundraising strategies
- Increase the visibility of the IAHP with fliers in journals and magazines, and partnership and / or participation with recognized events.
- Intensify and optimize the process of economic forecasting to preserve the "baseline activity" of the IAHP in case of economic emergency.

Membership

- Increase the number of members by offering tangible benefits, such as an affiliation with a palliative care journal – In progress
- Explore the benefits of 'collective memberships'

Programs

- Improve the communication process promoting and offering the different IAHP programs - In progress.
- Evaluate IAHP programs with established criteria based on their cost-benefit ratio

Governance

- Evaluate with an on-line survey the Board Members preferences and possibilities to work in the tasks necessary to optimize and increase the IAHP activity.
- Optimize the IAHP BOARD PARTICIPATION FORM.
- To continuously assess and communicate the activity of Board Members.

Current programs

- Improve the process used to select scholars. Their learning interests should match both the needs of their region and the offers of the host.
- Identify and support teams and institutions accepting scholars: they could be identified as training units for future educative activities.

New projects

New projects to advance the mission of IAHPH were proposed which are currently in development.

FINANCIAL REPORT

Profit and Loss (P&L) and Balance Sheet (BS) (Included in Annex 1 and 2)

These statements include two basic categories within income and expense: Unrestricted and Restricted. We are allowed to spend the unrestricted donations we decide fit (for example donations received from private industry and also those coming in through our website). Restricted donations are those we receive conditioned to spend in a designated manner by the donor. The P& L shows the level of income and expenses of the organization.

Income (Membership revenues, grants and donations): Revenue for 2008 was slightly over \$50,000 than for 2007 thanks to an increase in donations and grants, mainly from individuals and corporations. The most important sources of income (rounded values) and their trend since 2001 are (not including in-kind donations):

An important in-kind donation we are receiving since 2005 is a grant from Google Foundation which places our website at the top level in its search engine results. Every time a searcher clicks on our website through a Google search, each click counts as a donation which is quantified depending on the terms used for the search and other criteria defined by Google. At the end of 2008 this donation totaled more than \$120,000 (acc 4540). We recognize the income as an in-kind donation, and then the expense as a restricted expense for website positioning (acc 6615).

Major donors for the year include US Cancer Pain Relief Committee (\$75,000); Grunenthal GmbH (\$34,500), Purdue Fund (\$25,000) and Open Society Institute (\$20,000). We are very grateful with our donors for their support and trust in the organization.

A donation campaign was launched by sending out donation envelopes to the IAHPH members. A larger campaign with members both in the USA and abroad as well as donors in the USA and Canada will be started in 2009.

Expenses: Expenses were also 11% greater than originally expected. Regarding expense we had additional expenses in Salary and Taxes due to the addition of a half time employee (Ms Paige Finan, as Coordinator of Information Services).

For 2008 we had a net loss of -\$971. However, we also have an unrealized loss of \$15,533 which reflects the loss in value of our investment in our portfolio at Merrill Lynch. This loss (or gain) will become real at the moment we liquefy the investment.

The Balance Sheet shows our assets and liabilities by the end of 2008. At the end of 2008, the cash in banks was over \$70,000. The only significant liability we have is in the Faculty Development program which is based on a four year agreement with the different institutions. (\$23,350). The total amount for the grant (for the four years) is registered at the beginning of the agreement as a liability and it is diminished as the periodic payments are made. Once paid, they are reflected in the P&L.

Traveling Fellowship Program

Traveling Fellowships are awarded to individuals who apply for support to cover the cost of travel to teach and train in a hospice, palliative care unit, community program or university in a developing country. Traveling Fellows should have a significant amount of experience in palliative care and sufficient expertise to be able to teach to students and others. In 2008, we awarded the following

- Gaye Bishop, palliative care nurse from Australia traveled to Goma in the DR of Congo for 2 weeks. Ms Bishop was invited by HEAL Africa and spent teaching doctors and nurses, allied health and carers the principles of a Palliative Approach, symptom management and assisted with establishing a community Palliative care program.
- Tom Middlemiss a physician from the UK, traveled to India, invited by the Trivandrum Institute of Palliative Sciences in Kerala. Dr. Middlemiss will be staying in Trivandrum until the end of June 2009.

Annex 3 includes list of all the grantees of this program since it was started by Roger Woodruff. Their reports are published in the IAHPHC Newsletter.

Traveling Scholarship Program

The traveling Scholarship Program provides financial support to regional and local leaders from developing countries, to help them pay for their travel to an international meeting or congress.

Scholars apply online through our website and a group of members from the board discusses and decides on the application and the amount granted to each grantee. The reports from these traveling scholars are published in our Newsletter.

Table in Annex 4 includes the names of all the recipients of TS grants since the start of the program.

Meetings, Seminars and Workshops

Through this program, we support selected seminars, congresses, meetings and training opportunities by funding participants from developing countries. These include:

- Congress of the African Palliative Care Association (APCA)
- Congress of the Asia Pacific Hospice and Palliative Care Network (APHN)
- Congress of the European Association for Palliative Care (EAPC)
- International Palliative Care Congress, Montreal, Canada
- Congress of the Latin American Association for Palliative Care (Asociacion Latinoamericana de Cuidados Paliativos - ALCP)
- World Congress on Psycho-Oncology of the International Psycho-Oncology Society

In addition to these, we also support sporadic courses or teaching seminars in developing countries, by funding faculty members who teach in these seminars or by funding participants from the corresponding region.

During 2008 we provided support to organizations by funding the travel of participants from developing countries the congresses of the Latin American Association for Palliative Care in Lima, Peru; the International Psycho-Oncology Society in Madrid, Spain and the International Congress on the Terminally Ill in Montreal, Canada and an ELNEC teaching course in India. More than \$60,000 were disbursed through this program. Annex 5 includes the list of all the grantees who benefited from this program.

Faculty Development Program

The main objective of this program is to promote the development of palliative care in health care institutions in developing countries by supporting faculty palliative care positions for nurses or physicians in developing countries. Funding is contingent to the completion of set goals and outcome measures. A Board committee oversees the selection and monitoring of the programs.

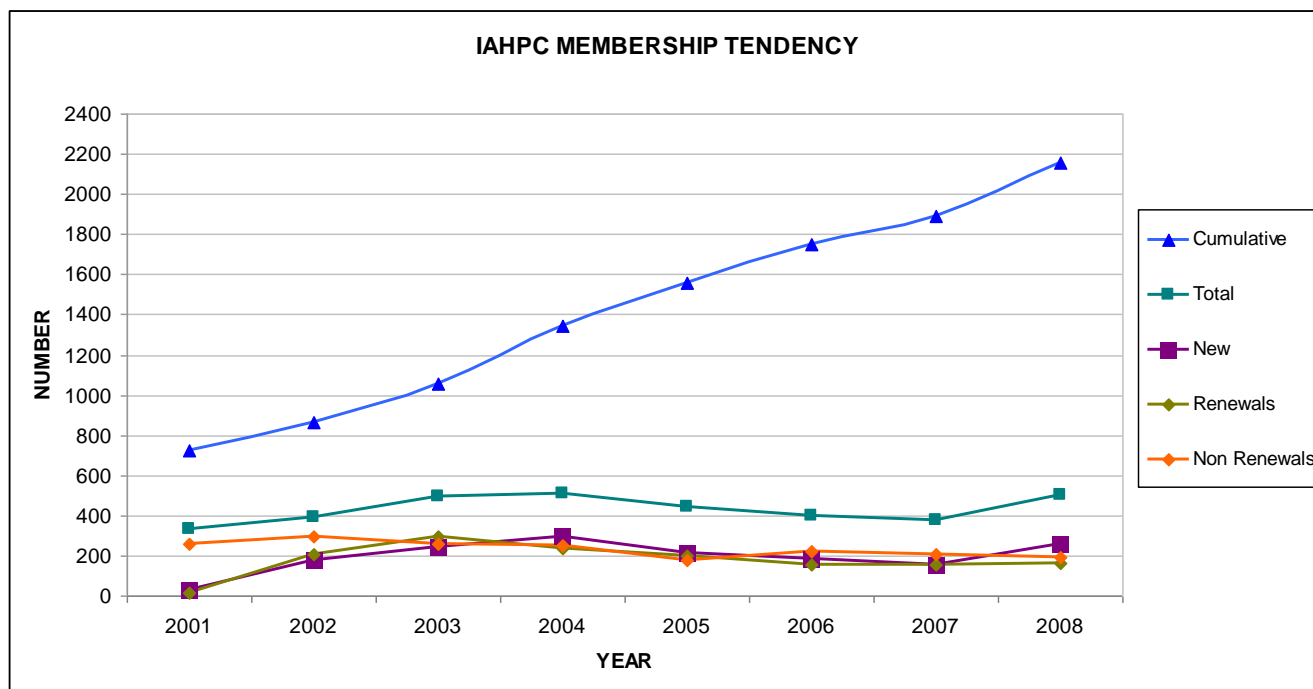
To date, five Faculty Development grants have been awarded:

- Programa de Cuidados Paliativos, Secretaria de Salud Municipal in Rosario, Argentina (as a pilot project) IAHP Board Mentor: Eduardo Bruera (USA)
- Amrita Institute of Medical Sciences in Kerala, India (co-funded with a grant from NHPCO – program was terminated due to changes in administration) IAHP Board Mentor: M.R. Rajagopal (India)
- Palliative Care Program at Ocean Road cancer Institute, Dar es Salaam, Tanzania IAHP Board Mentor: Liz Gwyther (South Africa)
- Palliative Care Program at Sichuan University in Chengdu, China. Mentor: KS Chan (Hong Kong)
- Programa de Cuidados Paliativos at the Universidad Catolica, in Santiago, Chile. Mentor: Roberto Wenk (Argentina)

MEMBERSHIP

Total membership at the end of 2008 was 501 - the figure below show the membership tendency over the years.



In 2008, the geographical distribution of members was as follows: Thirty three percent from North America, followed by Latin America (27%); Asia (14%), Africa (9%), Western Europe (7%), Australasia (5%), Eastern Europe (3%) and Middle East (2%).

During 2008 we increased the number of active members, thanks in part to the grants we are offering to provide support to attend Congresses and Conferences. Our greatest challenge is to keep the loyalty of our members. Most do not renew and we believe this is due to the fact that we provide limited tangible benefits.

A membership report is sent three times a year to our members, via email. This report provides a brief summary of the financial situation, programs and grants and some additional information of interest to the members.

PUBLICATIONS – IAHPC PRESS

WEBSITE

Following the current guidelines, we are now using number of visitors and not hits as the indicator of website utilization. In the past year we registered over 160.000 visitors from all over the world. Our website continues to be truly global visited by hundreds from around the world but we still see limited visitors from our colleagues from Eastern European, African and Asian countries.

NEWSLETTER

The Newsletter (NL) continues to be an extraordinary source of information about IAHPC, our programs and grant opportunities as well as a source of information about program development, events, and other news from the global palliative care community.

The individuals responsible for the Newsletter are:

- William Farr, who has been the editor for the past thirteen years as a service to the organization.
- Anne Laidlaw, the IAHPC webmaster is responsible for layout, design and for the distribution and dissemination.
- Liliana De Lima, is responsible for collecting the information and sending it to the editor.

In addition to the above, Doctor Roger Woodruff writes every month the palliative care book reviews, which have become very popular. His section registers the greatest amount of hits in the NL.

The number of subscribers by December 31st, 2008 was 6,380.

COLLABORATION WITH OTHER ORGANIZATIONS

As in previous years, the IAHPC has a policy of collaboration with international and regional organizations to support and advance palliative care globally. The following is a brief summary of some of the collaborative projects the organization did during 2008. For additional information or for information about previous years, please contact the IAHPC Executive Director.

Worldwide Palliative Care Alliance: IAHPC collaborates with the WPCA in the following areas and projects:

- Promotion of the World Hospice and Palliative Care Day. IAHPC supports, endorses and also disseminates information about the WHPCD.
- Global AIDS Forum in Mexico 2008: Through advocacy and letters sent to the Organizing Committee, a palliative care session was for the first time in 14 years, included in the agenda of the Congress. LDL gave a presentation in this panel.

- Joint Declaration and Statement of Commitment to recognize Palliative Care and Pain Treatment as Human Rights. To date, the Declaration has been signed by more than 4,000 individuals and endorsed by more than 600 organizations.

European Association for Palliative Care:

As a member of the *EAPC Task Force on the development of Palliative Care in Europe* the IAHP has collaborated with other members of this task force in the development of surveys, measuring tools, identification of indicators and development of reports. A strong partner in this TF is the International Observatory in End of Life Care at the University of Lancaster. Specific help has also been provided by:

- Grants to support the works of the task force for the past 3 years, including 2008.
- IAHP Press published the report called the EAPC Atlas on Palliative Care in Europe.
- Updates and reports on the Task Force have also been published in peer reviewed journals.

Latin American Association for Palliative Care (ALCP): IAHP has collaborated with the ALCP by providing technical and financial assistance to the organization in developing its management and governance structure. During 2008 it was able to donate funds to the support of the ALCP Congress in Lima, Peru.

In addition to the Congress, IAHP Press published the ALCP Curriculum in Palliative Care for Nurses. The Curriculum is available in the ALCP website at

International Union Against Cancer (UICC). The UICC invited IAHP to be a signatory in the World Cancer Declaration and attended a high profile meeting at the World Economic Forum in Geneva, where the Declaration was launched. The IAHP also funded three participants from developing countries to attend this Congress in Geneva, Switzerland on June 2008.

CONCLUSION

IAHP has been able to establish itself as an organization which provides support to individuals and programs around the world, to help develop and implement palliative care programs. It has also established itself as an organization with credibility among health care workers across the globe.

The near future poses great challenges, due to the current financial and economic situation. We will take the necessary measures and steps to ensure that the organization is suited to meet its obligations and continue fulfilling its mission.

We are very grateful with our Board of Directors, staff members, international community, donors, friends, patients, families, organizations, private companies and colleagues, our members and supporters who with their support, hard work, donations and other ways have helped IAHP continue achieving its mission.
